### Governor's Message

## The Governor's Thoughts on Club Visits



Fellow Rotarians,

On October 3, I completed my journey around District 7500 in which I visited all 42 clubs. To my amazement, I was able to stay on schedule, find every meeting place, and be on time. I was pleased that every club president completed the *Guide to Effective Rotary Clubs*, which stated the clubs goals and gave extensive information about each club. The process of completing the *Guides* was a collaborative effort of the Club presidents and the Assistant Governors. I felt, going in, that I was familiar with the club being visited and I could ask meaningful questions.

The one thing I found is that there are no "bad" clubs in the District. Each club has its own positive characteristics. Several of the smaller clubs take pride in their cohesiveness and successful projects. Some of the larger clubs are proud of their community status and the fellowship shared by their members. My task was to bring awareness that when a club gets too small, officers have to serve multiple terms and the same few people have to do everything. Larger clubs were reminded that to flourish, membership, new projects, the Rotary International Foundation, and leadership development are the

necessary elements of a well-rounded, effective Rotary Club.

The overwhelming feeling I carry is from the respect and friendly reception I received from every single club I visited. This respect for the position of District Governor filled me with a sense of responsibility to measure up to the expectations of my fellow Rotarians. Almost every club had their leading officers present an hour before the meeting, and the clubs cleared their agenda to make time for my presentation. Also gratifying was the presence and involvement of the Deputy/Assistant Governors. Deputy Governors; Leonard Adams and Rosemary Kay, and Assistant Governors; Richard Hart, Glen Walton, Harry Donnon, Robert Kee, III, David Hoder, Jay Pierson, Constance Becraft, and Dan Cortese paved the way and attended almost every visit. They gained an in depth understanding of their assigned clubs and will be able to help these clubs with their goals and needs as we go forward.

Bhichai Rattakul, our International President advocates that the best goals are those, which are set by the clubs themselves. With this philosophy in mind, I tried not to impose my goals but rather let the clubs state their own. I was pleased that the stated goals for membership were higher than the ones set last

year. Our membership goal is a net seven which is an increase of two over the previous year. We do have a set District Foundation goal of \$150,000. This includes Annual Giving - \$100,000, and \$50,000 for Polio Plus, which aims to eradicate Polio by 2005. The clubs' own stated goals amounted to \$137,000, which is higher than we ever raised before. Many clubs asked for assistance with Foundation paperwork and information in an effort to improve their level of giving. Our foundation Committee is addressing these needs. We are confident that we will reach both our Annual Giving and Eradication Goals, this year.

Finally, my personal reflections are those of making new friends, exploring the towns and beaches of Ocean and Monmouth Counties, happy and sad dollars, driving into the sunrise, hitting a deer, not getting speeding tickets, going South when I should have been going North on the Garden State Parkway, some beautiful ocean and bay views while I was giving my talks, and keeping my weight reasonably under control.

I thank each and every Rotary Club in District 7500 for the kind consideration they gave me.

## **MOUNT HOLLY ROTARY RECOGNIZES "GROUND ZERO HEROES"**

### **Club Sponsors Special September 11 Remembrance**

The first anniversary of the day international terrorism tragically reached America's shores was solemnly observed this September 11 by the Mount Holly Rotary Club with a special remembrance featuring three local "Ground Zero Heroes."

A special luncheon program that day featured Phyllis R. Worrell, a paramedic and rescuer; Rev. William H. Walker, a chaplain and crisis counselor; and Joseph Stringfellow, an emergency medical technician.

Each spoke about their critical and profound roles in the aftermath of the devastating terrorist attack on New York City and Worrell narrated a special slide presentation.

Two of the "Ground Zero Heroes" have Rotary affiliations. Bill Walker is a member of the Wrightstown Rotary Club and Joe Stringfellow's wife, Janine, is secretary of the Willingboro Rotary Club.

Neighboring Rotary Clubs were invited to participate and the interest level was impressive. Members of the Bordentown, Maple Shade, Moorestown Breakfast, PRC, Pemberton, Willingboro, and Wrightstown clubs were represented. Among those in attendance was Dis-

trict Governor Larry Ninerell and Deputy Governor Rosemary Kay.

A reporter from The Trenton Times covered the meeting event and authored an extensive article in the following day's newspaper.

Richard Strobel, president of the Mount Holly Rotary Club, explained that since September 11 fell this year on a Wednesday, the club's regular weekly meeting day, the Club wanted to arrange a special program befitting this solemn day. He especially wanted to honor local residents who heroically left their own families and jobs in order to help those afflicted by the tragedy.

"Everyone remembers where they were when they learned about the terrorist attacks on 9/11," President Strobel said. "Just like Pearl Harbor Day, the events of September 11, 2001 are imprinted indelibly in our minds and will forever cause Americans to pause and remember."

Worrell is a member of Task Force One of the New Jersey Urban Search and Rescue Team, an elite team comprised of specially trained State Police troopers, members of career and volunteer fire services, EMS, hazardous materials teams,

and rescue departments throughout the state. Under the jurisdiction of the State Office of Emergency Management, Task Force One sent approximately 140 members to Ground Zero including specialists in technical search, K9, heavy rigging, specialized rescue, hazardous materials, information technology, medical and other disciplines. Task Force One was the first team of its kind to arrive in New York City on September 11. Worrell is corporate emergency management coordinator for Virtua Health System in Mount Holly.

Rev. Walker, a member of the Critical Incident Stress Team, served as a chaplain and crisis counselor at Ground Zero. Because of his specialized training and devotion to duty, he was a constant presence at the disaster site for months. He is pastor of Sykesville Presbyterian Church in North Hanover Township, chaplain for the Jacobstown Fire Department, and adjunct professor at Burlington County College.

"As we reflect, we can learn a lot from heroes in our midst such as Phyllis Worrell, Rev. Bill Walker, and Joe Stringfellow," President Strobel added.

Each fall Rotary International seeks young people 15-1/2 to 18-1/2 years of age, who are interested in studying for a full year in a foreign country. There are no language requirements for most countries.

If you have an interest in TRAVELLING TO FOREIGN LANDS, learning a SECOND LANGUAGE, MEETING EXOTIC new PEOPLE and generally CHALLENGING YOURSELF, the Rotary Exchange Program may be custom made for you.

Young people live in a country of your choice with a Rotarian family, attend high school, meet a whole

new group of friends, receive a small monthly allowance and then TRANSFER THE ACADEMIC CREDIT back to your New Jersey high school.

“Expenses, when compared with other exchange or travel programs are modest. Parents are responsible for providing roundtrip airfare, insurance and extra spending money,” according to Dr. Walter E. Haworth, Co-Chairman of the program. The host Rotary Club will provide housing, board, monthly spending money and parental supervision.

If you are interested in studying abroad during 2003/04, you should

## GIFT OF LIFE FOUNDATION THREE ROTARY CLUBS JOIN CENTRAL OCEAN IN SPONSORING HEART & SNOW BALL

## ROTARY YOUTH LEADERS ENJOY ANOTHER SUCCESSFUL CONFERENCE

As the year was ending for Rotary, and District 7500 said farewell to one District Governor and welcomed another, RYLA (Rotary Youth Leaders Academy) was just beginning for 120 students from Monmouth, Ocean and Burlington Counties.

This year's RYLA conference was held from June 29 to July 2, 2002 at beautiful Georgian Court College (GCC) in Lakewood, NJ. Any High School Sophomore or Junior living in Burlington, Monmouth or Ocean County is eligible to attend the conference.

Out of the District's 41 Clubs, 35 participated by sending students to RYLA. The Clubs exceeded the RYLA Committee's expectations and sent 120 students this year. The Committee hopes that those clubs who did not participate this year, will follow the lead of the many clubs who did and send a student next year.

The Committee thanks those clubs that did send students to RYLA. The dedication and involvement given by the Clubs of the District help the growth of RYLA and the students who attend each year. RYLA is one of the most significant and growing programs in Rotary Service. Each year thousands of young people take part in the program worldwide. Their influence

spreads even further as they take their skills and knowledge back to their schools and communities and put them into practice. The level of training provided at District 7500 RYLA is comparable to executive training programs costing thousands of dollars. So, thank you to the generosity of the Rotary Clubs of District 7500 for sending eligible students to RYLA.

District 7500 RYLA first got its roots when we were part of District 7640 and the first RYLA was held in 1980 at Stockton College in Pomona, New Jersey. It was here that Pete Heberling from Bordentown Rotary first encountered RYLA. Pete has served on the District RYLA Committee almost continuously since 1980. Currently, he is Chairman of the District 7500 RYLA Committee. RYLA is an intense four-day leadership conference run by outstanding Rotarians and older youth who have demonstrated their extensive leadership ability through high achievement in their communities.
