Reminder!!!!

Flu Season will be upon us soon. Don't forget to get your Flu Shots. Everyone over the age of 65 should receive Flu vaccine especially if you are being treated for a chronic or debilitating disease.

Flu vaccine will not give you the flu. Sometimes the area of injection becomes red, hot and sore. This is a normal body reaction and usually only lasts 24 to 48 hours. If this happens to you and lasts more than 48 hours, notify your Primary Care Physician.

Some people are allergic to eggs and should not take the vaccine. Your Primary Care Physician is the best source of advice, if you think you should not take the vaccine. People, who have had previous allergic reactions to the vaccine, should not take the vaccine.

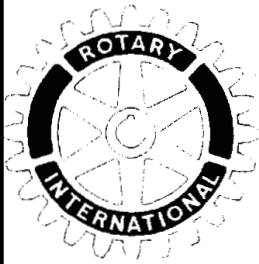

PAST DISTRICT GOVERNOR'S NEWS CORNER

Why Vocational Service? As a Rotarian engaged in a Business or Profession, it is expected that you will seek opportunities to serve, but Vocational Service reaches out and touches every Rotarian in ways rooted in their respective careers. During new member orientation this is an area of major focus. As a reader, recall the discussion on the day of your formal entry to the club. Recall your remarks as a new member? Do you recall being encouraged to mention your business by Name for the last time gratis? Basic to that ploy is the declaration that "the Rotarian will neither seek from nor grant to a fellow Rotarian a privilege or advantage not normally accorded others in a business or professional relationship". Also, the Rotarian is committed to "Offer my Vocational Talents: to provide opportunities for young people, to work for the relief of the special needs of others, and to improve the quality of life in MY COMMUNITY". Hence, there is every good reason to embrace Vocational Service as an integral part of your Rotary life.

Vocational Service is so endemic to Rotary life that defining it as a separate avenue of service often causes confusion as the lines between community, club and international service are drawn for project administration reasons. As members mature and stake out their areas of interest, Vocational Service becomes clear as an area of concentration. Because the behavior of the community is largely dominated by the business mind, society around us becomes great in proportion to the function of business people. Hence, motivation is largely self-driven. The rewards are

compounded in proportion to members' participation.

Rewards in the form of recognition flow from participation. Both group and individual recognition is plentiful. In New Jersey a State-wide Vocational Assembly meets annually at which each district makes a Vocational Service Award. The selection for these awards is competitive at each district level. The level of competition is high enough to rule out repeat selections. The prestige of this Assembly within Rotary is sufficient to insure the attendance of the President of Rotary International on a regular basis. For outstanding service the clubs may provide local recognition. Finally, the successful completion of projects provide their own satisfaction, generally far exceeding any other reward.

Within Rotary the opportunities for service are boundless. Recent developments have led to the growth of many International Vocational Contact Groups. These are groups of Rotarians, associated by their professions, who wish to share fellowship, ideas for service projects and any informal exchanges. Communication is through letters, phone, the Web and any means available.

If you haven't participated in one of these groups yet, put it in your plans. There is a lot to be contributed and a lot to be gained.

FOREIGN STUDY APPLICATIONS AVAILABLE

Each fall Rotary International seeks young people 15 1/2 - 18 1/2 years of age, who are interested in studying for a full year in a foreign country. There are no language requirements for most countries.

Young adults should be well adjusted, enjoy family relationships, possess an inquiring mind and be interested in their own environment, the world and its problems. Young people seeking a greater understanding of a foreign culture, an opportunity to explain ours, and mastery of a foreign language can spend a year living with a Rotary family and studying in the local high school. Credits earned abroad can be transferred to New Jersey High Schools.

Expenses, when compared with other exchange or travel programs, are modest. Parents are responsible for providing roundtrip airfare, insurance and extra spending money. The host Rotary Club will provide housing, board, monthly spending money and parental supervision.

If you are interested in studying abroad during 2002/03, you should apply by December 30, 2001. Students are then screened for study in one of 40 foreign countries.

Barbara Tuttle Receives District 7500 Vocational Service Award

The Vocational Service Awards highlighted the 21st Vocational Assembly held on October 8, at the Birchwood Manor in Whippany, New Jersey. The recipient of this year's District 7500 award was Barbara Tuttle of the Matawan Rotary Club. Barbara is a realtor who is deeply involved in community volunteerism. She became Matawan's first woman member and has served Rotary by holding several club and district offices. Her activities include, facilitating the stay of Anna from Russia, the district's first Gift of life Child, participating in the Group Study Exchange, and she was instrumental in starting the Matawan Interact Club. RI President Elect Frank Devlin installed Barbara as a Paul Harris Fellow at the Strike Out Hunger Ballgame. The Matawan Rotary Club also named her a Paul Harris Fellow. She later named her two daughters, Donna and Sandy as Paul Harris Fellows. Barbara Tuttle has used the Four Way Test as a guide in her business and personal life. Barbara highly values the quality of the friendships she has developed through Rotary.

Approximately 480 Rotarians from Districts 7210, 7470, 7490, 7500, 7640 joined host district 7510 in attending the event.

Gift of Life Update

The two children mentioned in the latest edition of the District newsletter have since or are about to return home. Twelve year old Zhen-zhen Yao and her mother returned to China on September 19. Six year old Diana Vargas will be returning to Quito Ecuador on October 12.

The medical records of 11 year old Nicholas Kordzadze of the Republic of Georgia are being reviewed by doctors at Montefiore Hospital in New York. If approved, Nicholas and his mother will be hosted by Larry Firestone of the Red Bank Club.

We sent a check for \$8,000 to the Deborah Heart & Lung Center to fund their fact finding mission to China. The eight person team is scheduled to depart for China on October 28.

Upon the groups return, Spero Margeotes, President & CEO of Deborah will provide the Foundation with a presentation of the results of the trip.

In addition we sent a check for \$6,000 to the International Children's Heart Foundation of Memphis Tennessee to help fund their trip to Managua, Nicaragua scheduled to depart on October 20. The ICHF will treat about 100 children and perform approximately 20 open heart surgeries during their two week stay. The GOL operation of District 7470 in North Jersey is also contributing \$6,000 to ICHF and is sending one of their Trustees with the group. Barbara Smith, Executive Director of 7470's GOL Foundation will provide us with duplicate photos and video tapes of the trip.

ICHF is a well organized operation. They make several trips a year. They are scheduled to travel to Lima, Peru in November and Zagreb, Croatia in December. 100% of what they do is related to Pediatric Cardiology. They have 300 medical professionals from around the Country on staff who give freely of their time to travel at least once a year with the Foundation.

Chuck Abbate has made some progress with respect to our fundraiser. We plan on conducting a concert at the 1000 seat Strand theater in Lakewood in May of 2002. The Reverend Alphonse Stephensen and the Orchestra of St. Peter by the Sea will be the featured attraction. 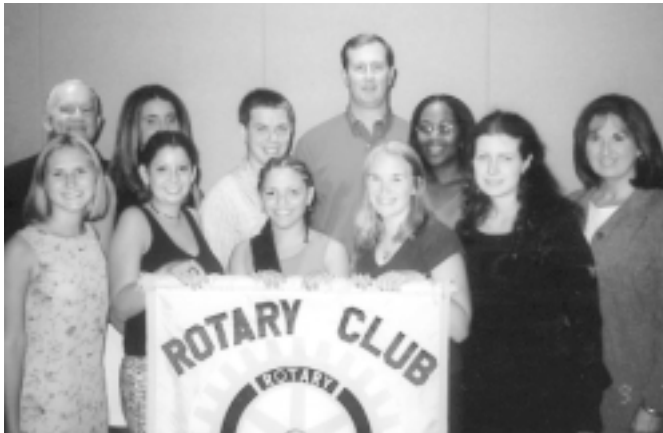
