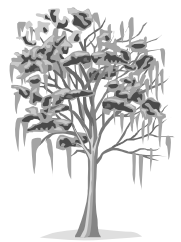
### The Story of a Small Tree

# CLUB NEWS

## ROTARY CLUB OF ASBURY PARK'S NEW JERSEY ADOPT-A-HIGHWAY PROGRAM



As it reaches the end of its Rotary year, the Rotary Club of Asbury Park completes its third year with the New Jersey Adopt-A-Highway Program, a statewide program operated by the New Jersey Department of Transportation. The Rotary Club of Asbury Park committed to pick up litter four times a year upon a one-mile section of State Highway #66, immediately west of the Asbury Park Circle.

State Highway # 66 abuts several retail malls and an office complex. Automobile and pedestrian traffic along the corridor is heavy, and, as a result of the use intensity, there is a substantial amount of trash to be collected. Items typically found include paper products, plastics, metal, and various auto parts. Last time out, the club collected thirty-three bags of garbage.

The effectiveness of the efforts of The Rotary Club of Asbury Park extends beyond the immediate area. State Route #66 also abuts a stream that flows into Deal Lake and, ultimately, the Atlantic Ocean. The Club's efforts, while concentrated within a one-mile section of highway, benefit the surrounding community on a regional scale by preventing the influx of floating trash at its source.

While initial club participation afforded only moderate results, the continuing increase has enabled the club to clean up more of the highway in less time. Camaraderie only adds to the sense of accomplishment. The project satisfies the objective of the club, which is to provide service to the community. At the same time, it is a source of pride within the club and raises the visibility of the club within the community.



# UNITED STATES FLAG PROTOCOL

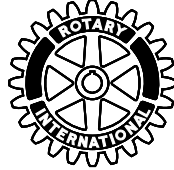
As with all flags, the National Flag should be raised and lowered by hand. Do not raise the flag while it is furled. Unfurl, then hoist quickly to the top of the staff. Lower it slowly and with dignity. Place no object on or over the flag. Do not use the flag to cover a speaker's table. Render your flag the respect to which it is entitled by observing the following rules:

1. When displayed over the middle of the street, the flag should be suspended vertically with the union (blue field) to the north in an east and west street, or to the east in a north and south street.
2. When displayed with another flag from crossed staffs, the flag of the United States should be on the right (the flag's own right, the observer's left), and its staff should be in front of the staff of the other flag.
3. When it is to be flown at half-mast, the flag should be hoisted to the peak for an instant, then lowered to the half-mast position. Before lowering the flag for the day, it should again be raised to the peak, then lowered. Half-mast is one-half the distance between the top and bottom of the staff. On Memorial Day, display at half-mast until noon, then hoist to the top of the staff.
4. When the flag is suspended over a sidewalk from a rope extending from house to pole at the edge of the sidewalk, the flag should be hoisted out from the building toward the building toward the pole, union (blue field) first.
5. When the flag is displayed from a staff projecting horizon tally or at any angle from the window sill, balcony, or front of a building, the union (blue field) of the flag should go to the peak of the staff (unless the flag is to be displayed at half mast).
6. When the flag is displayed in a manner other than being flown from a staff, it should be displayed flat, whether indoors or out. When displayed either horizontally or vertically against a wall, the union (blue field) should be uppermost and to the observer's left. When displayed in a window, it should be displayed in the same way, that is, with the union to the left of the observer in the street.
7. When carried in a procession with another flag or flags, the Stars and Stripes should be either on the marching right, or when there is a line of other flags, in front of the center of that line.
8. When a number of flags of states or cities or pennants of societies are grouped and displayed from staffs with our National Flag, the latter should be at the center or at the highest point of the group.
9. When the flag is used to cover a casket, it should be placed so that the union (blue field) is at the head and over the left shoulder. The flag should not be lowered into the grave or allowed to touch the ground.

## NEEDS FOR ORPHANAGE

The Orphanage Project, which has been both an outgrowth from and a partner with Rotarians of District 7500, will send the seventh container of food and other needed items to the Hogar Armando Rosenberg in the Dominican Republic on August 24, 2002 from Willingboro. It is hoped that once again the Rotary Clubs of District 7500 will assist in filling the container with those items that will ensure food and other necessities to the children cared for at the Hogar.

The last container, shipped in August 2000, contained 150 mattresses to replace the dilapidated and worn-out bedding that was at the Hogar. They were all purchased through the donation of \$400 units by our Rotary Clubs.

This time, the need is for food, since the governmental allowance to the Hogar for food has been cut so that there is simply not enough food. It is estimated that with a \$400 unit we will be able to provide enough supplemental food for a two-week period. If 25 such units are given, that should en-

able food supplements to cover the next school year.

Although past containers have included donations of food, it has been difficult handling small cans because each must be manifested for customs. And the opening and use of small cans, often of varied contents, is difficult, since about 160 persons are fed at each meal. Donations needed are either the \$400 units for food purchase or cartons of #10 cans of vegetables or tomatoes, of institutional-size cans of meat (tuna or chicken), of cartons of powdered milk, cereals, and pasta products. (No rice is being sent because of possible insect infestation and since it is easily available in the Dominican Republic.)

The sisters staffing the Hogar have also indicated a need for necessities such as toilet paper, cold-water detergent, bath soap, toothpaste, and school supplies. We will accept, pack and send these as individual items. Rotarians are encouraged to pick up and donate a tube of toothpaste, or a large package

of toilet paper, or some full-size bar soap when the supermarkets have their frequent sales on these items. We can no longer send used clothing as has been done in the past due to an embargo in the Dominican Republic. New children's clothing, however, can be sent.

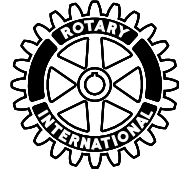
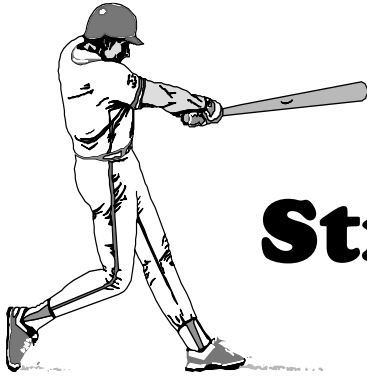
